23 Men Are OK In Submarine's 'Operation Hideout'

GROTON, Conn. (AP)—Navy brass and the 23 men who took part in it, agreed that "Operation Hideout" was a success—but for different reasons.

Navy officials said they got the answers to highly important questions during the two months an officer and 22 enlisted men were "buttoned up" in the submarine Haddock.

Life aboard the atomic submarines of the future will be less difficult because of the experiment, they said. Such subs, one of which is building nearby, are expected to be able to remain submerged indefinitely.

The 23 volunteers, sealed in the Haddock since Jan. 19, emerged from the vessel Thursday afternoon to be pronounced in good physical condition.

The submarine had been moored to a dock at the submarine base during the tests, mainly concerned with how the crew would withstand the effects of long exposure to carbon dioxide.

The 22 enlisted men were certain that the tests proved "you can believe your superior officer when he promises you all the beer you can drink."

Cmdr. Gerald J. Duffner, medical officer in charge of the project, said "Operation Hideout" was a complete success.

Half an hour after he said it, a barrel was tapped for the volunteers and the men quaffed the beer saying "it tastes as good as we knew it would."

Mining Methods On State Lands is Before Court for Decision

HARRISBURG (AP)—The Dauphin County Court is considering the legal question whether mining rights on state-owned property permits removal of the coal by removing the surface.

Atty. Gen. Robert E. Woodside argued before the court Thursday that agreements retaining mineral deposits in lands sold to the state provided only for removal of the deposits by underground mining.

Woodside asked the court to issue an injunction restraining the F. and W. Coal Co., Philadelphia, from conducting strip or surface mining operations in a tract of 3,400 acres in McCalmont Township, Jefferson County.

The land was brought by the State Game Commission in 1921 and 1923, with mineral deposits reserved. Counsel for the company contended it had the right under the agreement to remove the coal by any method it desired.
