Argentine Revolters Say They Were Heading Off Reds

Claim Moral and Political Chaos of Peron Regime Invites Commie Take-Over

MONTEVIDEO, Oct. 3 (INS)—Officers who fled to Uruguay when an abortive Argentine revolution was crushed insisted today they were trying to head off Communism. They denied planning to kill President Juan Peron. The officers said the "moral, economic and political chaos" created by the Peron government was preparing an atmosphere in which the Communists could take over.

To support their contention that the assassination of Peron, and his wife, Eva, was not planned, they emphasized that last Saturday's uprisings began more than three hours before the president and Argentina's first lady were to attend a public function.

Taking issue with what they termed "the unjustified charges preferred against us by the government and the Argentine press," the rebels denied receiving advice or backing from the United States or any other nation.

They also emphasized that they were hopeful of staging the coup with a minimum of bloodshed, and added:

"Our ambition was a free and just country, really sovereign and not in constant friction."

Says Minister Paid "Passionate Compliments" to Rich Widow

Young Churchman Maintains Autopsy Will Clear Him of Complicity in Her Death

DETROIT, Oct. 3 (UP)—A young minister accused of paying "passionate compliments" to an elderly widow to "get her worldly goods" said today an autopsy performed on her body would clear him of any complicity in her death.

Results of the autopsy, performed yesterday, were expected to be disclosed "within two or three days" by the Wayne county coroner's office.

Mrs. Mollie S. Williams, 76, who died last December, left \$60,000 to the Rev. Albert Ziarko, 29, and his mother, Mrs. Mae Ziarko. She left \$1 to her niece, Mrs. Lola Hamilton, 65.

Mrs. Hamilton, in a suit to break her aunt's will, charged Ziarko paid the wealthy widow "the most outrageous, flagrant and passionate compliments... to get her worldly goods."

The statements Mrs. Hamilton made are scandalous, malicious and deliberately false," Ziarko said. "Mrs. Hamilton and Mrs. Williams quarreled for a long time."

Mrs. Williams obtained a court order to exhume her aunt's body for an autopsy. The cause of death listed when she died was acute indigestion and heart trouble.

Detectives were prepared to enter the case if the autopsy showed any foul play was involved in Mrs. Williams' death. Ziarko, who offered to take a lie-detector test to prove he had nothing to do with the wealthy woman's death, said the autopsy "will disprove all of Mrs. Hamilton's statements."

FALL RIVER, Oct. 3 (UP)—Donat Gaudette was hospitalized in serious condition today because a stranger he met in a cafe wouldn't join him in "one for the road."

Michael Britt, bartender at the Acorn cafe, said Gaudette entered 10 minutes before closing time last night, had a beer and then asked a bystander, Clifton Harvey, to join him in a last drink.

When Harvey declined, Gaudette allegedly pulled out a .22-caliber pistol and said:

"Look, mister, I've got a gun."

Britt told police he came from behind the bar and hit Gaudette. The man's head struck the tiled floor, Britt said, and the gun discharged but no one was hit by the bullet.

Lynnfield Pilot Killed in Japan

LYNNFIELD, Oct. 3 (UP)—Mrs. Gladys H. Crawford, 40, who was to have sailed for Japan in December to join her husband, Maj. Wallace E. Crawford, 41, was informed yesterday that he had been killed in the crash of his cargo plane.

Mrs. Crawford and her three children had packed some of their belongings and were preparing to sell their home when news of his death arrived. His cargo plane crashed near his Japanese base as he returned from a mission to Korea.

Murray Says Four-Cent Hike Not Enough

CIO President Still Not Saying What Demand Will Be

DETROIT, Oct. 3 (AP)—It will take more than a four-cent an hour raise, says Philip Murray, to satisfy CIO members whose wages are not hitched to the cost-of-living.

But the CIO president still is not saying what the demand will be.

At a press conference the CIO's Murray was asked yesterday about forthcoming negotiations between the CIO Steelworkers union, which he also heads, and the steel industry. The negotiations, slated to start about Dec. 1, may have an important bearing on 1952's national wage pattern.

A reporter noted that the steelworkers would be permitted only an estimated four-cent increase under government wage controls.

Said Murray:

"I will tell you confidentially right now that four cents would be very low."

Then, at the reporter's urging, he said, "you can quote me flatly on that."

Murray said the steelworkers' demands would be drafted later by the union's policy committee.

Wakefield Woman Is Gas Victim

WAKEFIELD, Oct. 3 (INS)—An autopsy report was awaited today in the death of a Wakefield school committeeman's wife whose body was found in the gas-filled kitchen of her home. The body of Mrs. Lane W. Fuller, 34, was discovered by three children who detected the gas as they cut through her back yard. Police said Mrs. Fuller, mother of two small children, had been ill and under medical care.

Somerville Girl Routs Attacker

SOMERVILLE, Oct. 3 (UP)—An 18-year-old girl routed an attacker last night by biting his hand when he seized her, ripped the blouse from her shoulders and whispered:

"I've been watching you—now I've got you."

Mary Jane Westhoff, who bit her assailant's hand when he tried to place it over her mouth, suffered a cut cheek and bruised eye in the scuffle outside her home.

Miss Westhoff's father almost came out worse in the incident for, when his daughter screamed, both he and a group of youths on a nearby corner ran to her assistance. The youths, mistaking the father for the attacker, pinned him to a wall until they realized his identity.
