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Omaha Will Stop Dumping Its Garbage Into Missouri River

OMAHA (UP)—The Omaha City Council today unanimously approved a plan to turn the city's garbage over to a commercial firm which will process it into animal feed and end the controversial dumping of refuse into the Missouri River.

The council authorized Mayor Glenn Cunningham to sign a contract with Central States Corporation in which the city will agree to pay \$30,000 a year to the firm.

The central States will accept delivery of all garbage collected in Omaha and process it into a feed. The company said it will operate at a loss and must have a subsidy of about \$2,500 per month to make the project pay or to break even.

The proposed contract will run until Jan. 1, 1954.

Omaha has been dumping its garbage in the river since the Legislature enacted a law prohibiting feeding of raw garbage to hogs. Nebraska City, 51 river miles downstream, has vigorously protested the action and Mayor Victor Bremer has led an attack, charging that the garbage is polluting the river and endangering the downstream city's water supply. He has called it an "unhealthy act."

Cunningham at today's council meeting commented that Bremer has done "great harm to his people by inciting fears which were unfounded concerning the dumping of garbage in the river by Omaha."

The mayor said the dumping has done no harm. An estimated 60 to 80 tons has been dumped in for about two weeks.

Bremer has said the pollution has increased, causing discoloration of the river and odors in the water which is piped in for use by the city water plant.

The contract must be approved to the city council for final approval, considered a technicality in view of today's unanimous vote.

Cunningham stressed that contract which completed, will eliminate all river dumping.

Central States will not collect the garbage, but accept it from the city. Until Dec. 6, collection will be made by the Omaha Feeding Company, which owned the hogs which formerly consumed the garbage.

They were slaughtered after the legislative action, which came during the emergency created when the hog disease vesicular exanthema was discovered in the state.

Dog Or No Dog, He Must Pay Tax On Income

BOSTON (AP)—State Tax Commissioner Henry F. Long says he wants a \$30 inheritance tax from Lassie, a Quincyville bequeathed \$5,000 in the will of her late master.

"Dog or no dog," Long told reporters, "she must pay an inheritance tax."

Lassie's late owner, Axel R. Carlson, a retired gardener, left the bequest to care for the collie and sent her to live with Mrs. Gertrude Hanson, Quincy, a friend.

Long said he figured the tax at \$300—6 per cent of \$5,000 plus 23 per cent temporary surtax.

"Lassie will also have to pay a tax annually on any income her \$4,631 draws," he added.

Lassie was not available for comment but as her spokesman Mrs. Hanson said she would turn the matter over to lawyers.

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Russian Plan Is To Exceed U. S. Industry

VIENNA (AP)—Stalin's world Communist agents have been making clear what Russia's apparent aims are for the next 10 or 20 years.

Provided there isn't any war, Stalin wants to build up Russia's industrial strength so it finally exceeds that of the United States. After that, it would be a Russian-dominated world whether the U. S. likes it or not.

This is the interpretation put by experts on Russia in Vienna upon a revealing series of editorials in the weekly newspaper of the Communist. This is the policy guide book for Communists the world over.

With startling frankness, a Communist editorial recalled a long-forgotten statement of Stalin made 19 years ago, at the 18th Congress of the Russian Communist party. It said it still holds true.

"Stalin," recalled the Communist journal, "placed before the Soviet people a great historic task: to overtake and outstrip in the next 10 or 15 years the main capitalist countries... in volume of industrial output per capita of population."

Taking 10 years out for the war and for the re-establishment of prewar levels means the Soviet economy has now put in nine years toward achieving Stalin's ambition. That theoretically leaves the Soviets about six years to go to reach the goal.

But Western diplomats say there isn't a chance that Stalin's hopes will be realized. There have been too many changes since 1933. The war upped U. S. industrial strength to a point where, even if its current output of steel stood still, it would take Russia at least until 1965 to catch up.

One Killed In Rail Crossing Accident

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Trembley Has Had His Share Of Near Disasters, All Kinds

FAIRMONT, Minn. (AP)—Berey Trembley said he thought he "had it" Monday—but he hadn't.

Trembley—and he denies the name arose from his close brushes with disaster—was in the bathroom of his home when a blast ripped the house apart. It was blown from its foundation and the roof was lifted off. Doors were deformed, windows shattered and three rooms demolished.

Picking himself up after the explosion, Trembley discovered he wasn't scratched. Cause of the blast was being investigated by fire marshals. Meanwhile, Trembley explained.

He has twice escaped unhurt when his car rolled over. Once he survived a head-on collision. Another time he almost drowned. Oh yes, and the time he was rescued from the quicksand. And then, last fall, his hat was shot off his head while on a hunting trip.
