### Commie Directors

BORDEAUX, France, Oct. 15 (AP)—Two directors of the Com-  
munist newspaper Les Nouvelles  
de Bordeaux have been arrested  
and charged with provoking pil-  
lage. The charge was an out-  
growth of a Communist sacking  
of the U. S. Information service  
office here last May.

The Reds smashed into USIS  
headquarters during anti-Ridg-  
way riots, tore up large numbers  
of American publications and  
caused heavy damage.

The newspaper published a  
story calling the raid "a victory  
for France." The two directors  
are Henri Bordage and Raoul  
Martinez.

## Cartilage Now

### Packed in Jars

CHICAGO, Oct. 15 (AP)—Car-  
tilage packed in glass jars for  
use in plastic surgery can now be  
bought by doctors.

The material, used as the base  
on which to build new chins,  
noses and ears, is taken from the  
ends of the breastbones of freshly  
slaughtered steers. Cleaned and  
trimmed, it forms a soft white,  
rubbery half moon about 4 by 2  
inches and up to one half inch in  
thickness.

## Doctors Test

### Pearl's Heart

BOSTON, Oct. 15 (INS)—Doc-  
tors at Children's medical center  
today began final tests to de-  
termine whether little Pearl Si-  
mon of Abbeville, La., must un-  
dergo the heart surgery she fears  
so much.

The eight-year-old girl from  
Louisiana's bayou country at first  
refused to submit to an opera-  
tion. She said God told her in a  
dream that an operation would  
be fatal.

She finally consented to the  
surgery after her father, Alton,  
convinced her that the dream  
should not be taken too seri-  
ously. He persuaded her that the  
operation would not be contrary  
to God's will.

The child is afflicted with an  
ailment that is slowing her blood  
circulation. Unless relieved, it  
could bring about her death with-  
in four years.

### Car Hits Tree

MONTAGUE, Oct. 15 (INS)—  
A Greenfield girl and an Air  
Force corporal were killed and  
two companions were injured to-  
day when their car left a high-  
way and crashed into a tree in  
the Lake Pleasant section of  
Montague.

Killed were Patricia Pachalis,  
18, who was graduated from  
Greenfield high school last June,  
and Corp. Charles L. Keen, 21, of  
Potomac, Ill., stationed at West-  
over Air Force base.

Sgt. Elmer R. Sexton, 22, of  
High Point, N. C., was taken to  
Farren Memorial hospital in  
critical condition, suffering inter-  
nal injuries and facing possible  
loss of his right eye.

Also hospitalized was Laura  
Butler, 20, who lived at the  
YWCA in Springfield. Miss Pa-  
chalis also was residing there  
while continuing her studies.

The quartet was traveling

12 feet from the wreckage. The
