

### Christmas Giving Carried Too Far

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — After the recent arrest of four boys who are charged with burglarizing a store just before Christmas, Memphis police say the urge for holiday giving can get out of hand. The boys confessed that they stole from the store to get gifts for their girl friends.

The girls remained loyal to the boys and asked to be locked in jail with their friends so they could comfort them. That, the police would not permit.

The case reminded police of a Christmas night arrest, when they nabbed a man burglarizing a store just after he had played Santa Claus for his three children.

### \$20½ Million Sought For Bureau of Mines

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Truman has recommended an appropriation of 20½ million dollars for the U. S. Bureau of Mines in the year ending June 30, 1954. This is an increase of \$1,843,000 over the amount appropriated thus far for the year ending June 30, 1953.

The recommendation was included in Truman's \$72,900,000,000 total proposed new appropriations, which are subject to revision by

President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower and Congress.

Truman's recommended figure for the Bureau of Mines was broken down as follows, with the present fiscal year figures in parentheses:

Coal, \$2,472,558 (\$2,109,628); petroleum and natural gas, \$1,518,356 (\$1,343,356); synthetic liquid fuels, \$7,965,304 (\$7,630,304); helium, \$90,795 (no change); ferrous metals and alloys \$2,366,446 (\$1,793,719); nonferrous metals, \$3,805,675 (\$3,585,125); nonmetallic minerals, \$1,019,799 (\$883,294); unclassified mineral research, \$966,142 (\$915,854); control of fires in inactive coal deposits, \$354,925 (no change).

The bureau's work regarding fuels, minerals and metals leans heavily toward scientific research and engineering investigations. It includes, for example, studies of how to deal with the underground flooding of anthracite mines; research in the development and production of petroleum and natural gas; the operation of demonstration plants for the production of synthetic liquid fuels from coal, oil shale and agricultural and forest products; research into the resources, production, storage and use of helium.

An increased item was for mine inspections and investigations. Recommended was \$4,125,000 for the

### Polio Epidemic Of '52 To Have Effect For Many Years

In another appeal for March of Dimes contributions, Frank B. Rackley, Western Pennsylvania March of Dimes chairman said today: "The position of our county chapters parallels closely that of the nation as a whole. The 1952 polio epidemic, everyone should realize, was a disaster of such vast proportions that its effects will be felt for years to come."

"The March of Dimes starts out in 1953 with \$7,000,000 in unpaid bills, and yet we cannot refuse assistance to even a single person suffering from polio, now or later."

Funds raised here, said Rackley, must come from persons who realize they have a tremendous personal stake in the March of Dimes. "This," he said seriously, "is every man, woman and child, regardless of financial status."

Half of the money raised in Western Pennsylvania will remain here to assist local polio patients. The other half goes to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis for research, education and epidemic aid programs.

"All other years fade," Rackley said, "when compared with the national tragedy of 1952. For example the patient care costs of the severe 1949 epidemic amounted to \$23,000,000. Those of 1950 and 1951 came to \$23,000,000. Last year these costs amounted to \$28,000,000."

SEATTLE (AP) — A clergyman from tiny St. Paul Island in the Bering Sea says there is one special dietary drawback to life in that area where sea life abounds. No fish.

If he wants herring for his table, for example, they must be shipped from outside, explained the Rev. Makarx A. Baranoff of the Russian Orthodox Church.

"The seals catch all the fish for 100 miles around our island," he said. "The seals are much better fishermen than the Aleut natives. So the Aleuts spend their summers sealing and their winters in trapping foxes."

St. Paul is one of the Pribilof Islands, famed as the breeding grounds for the migrant seal herds of the Pacific.
