

"Contributing to the Red Cross drive," Dr. Prins said, "is your way to help your less fortunate friends who are sick and need blood. This year, too, you can help fight polio as the Red Cross is obtaining and processing blood to be used in providing gamma globulm for prevention of paralysis in polio epidemics."

The Office of Defense Mobilization will allocate the gamma globulin, Dr. Prins added. Red Cross fund Campaigns will

be conducted throughout March in most sections of the country.
