Seven Firms Offer Prizes For Egg Show

Seven Brainerd firms have announced they plan to offer prizes in connection with the Crow Wing County Egg show to be held in the REA building here Tuesday, Feb. 17.

Prizes include 100 pounds of chick starter and grower, and one bag of Saniflor litter by Pillsbury Mills; 100 pounds of chick starter by Brainerd Hatchery; one five-gallon poultry fountain by Northwest Feed and Hatchery; one bag of 3 percent cafeteria laying mash by the Cass-Crow Wing Cooperative.

One bag of 20 percent laying granulars by the Farmers Cooperative Feed Co.; 100 pounds of Occident laying mash by Pinecrest; and one two-quart pressure sprayer by Skarold Motors.

Poultry feed and equipment will be on display and a free lunch will be served. The program, sponsored by the Rural Relations committee of the Brainerd Civic association and the Agricultural Extension service, will include prizes for eggs entered in competition and information on feeding laying chickens and turkeys.

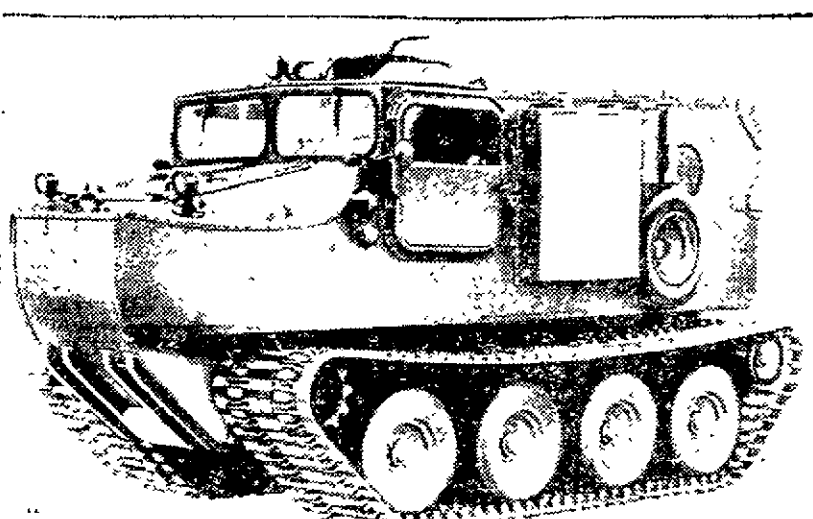

Rosenberg Execution Date May Be Within Few Weeks

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Condemned as atom spies, Julius and Ethel Rosenberg today faced the naming of an early execution date after a mystery-tinged development in their controversial case.

Roman Catholic sources at the Vatican said Thursday Pope Pius had intervened in behalf of the husband and wife, whom President Eisenhower has refused to spare from the electric chair.

In Washington, the apostolic delegation said appeals for the Rosenbergs received by the Pope had been sent to the Justice Department without entering "into the merits of the cases." The delegation said this was done last December, before presidential clemency was sought for the Rosenbergs.

But White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said there was no official record of such a Vatican approach. He said, however, there could have been a personal contact with some Justice Department official before the Eisenhower administration took office. James P. McGranery, Truman's last attorney general and a prominent Catholic layman, was not reached immediately.

In New York, meanwhile, U. S. Court of Appeals Judge Augustus N. Hand turned down a defense request to stay the execution pending an application for Supreme Court review of the case.

Federal Judge Irving R. Kaufman indicated in New York he will set an early execution date, possibly within a few weeks.

He told the Rosenbergs' attorney, who asked for a delay, that he did not believe "anything can be accomplished in too long a delay except bringing upon the prisoners mental anguish by instilling false hopes in them." Judge Kaufman will set the date Monday.

The electrocution, originally set for Jan. 14, has been postponed while the presidential appeal was pending.
