## DPA Favors Releasing Relief Rolls To Public

HARRISBURG (AP) — The State Public Assistance Department today declared it favors opening to the public the names, addresses and amounts of money given to "all" persons on relief.

Secretary Eleanor G. Evans told a newsman she likes the plan. "I can see no harm in it," she said. "I think it will satisfy the public that we are not trying to keep people on assistance who should not be."

Under existing law only information on persons receiving general assistance is open to the public. A bill introduced by Sen. G. Robert Watkins (R-Delaware) would extend the law to make public the names of those on rolls for the aged, blind, dependent children and disabled.

The information would be given only when asked for and only about specific persons. It could not be used for commercial or political purposes.

"This bill would make it possible for people to find out whether certain persons who they think are actually receiving payments," another department spokesman said. "As a by-product," he added, "the department will probably be given information that will help catch chiselers."

Other features of the new bill would:

1. Increase jail terms from six months to one year and fines from \$500 to \$1,000 for persons convicted of making unlawful applications for relief.
2. Speed up prosecution of violators by allowing the Public As-

assistance Department to take fraud cases directly to court instead of first going to justices of the peace or aldermen.

3. Shift responsibility for care of the indigent, homeless or transient from the state to county homes or private agencies.

4. Require county assistance boards to obey state regulations on overall standards and eligibility.

5. Authorize the public assistance department to hire special investigators.

6. Make county boards keep a constant check on the eligibility of persons on relief.

7. Require county assistance boards to organize once a year instead of just when the chairman calls an organization meeting.

8. Permit members of county boards to serve three consecutive terms instead of two.

9. Ban relief payments to blind persons who are in prison.

## Navy Cuts Down On Signing Inexperienced Men In Its Reserve

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy is cutting down sharply on the signing of draft-age, inexperienced men in its reserve.

Officials said this week the influx of such men in the reserve was having two results: the Navy did not desire:

1. It was cutting down on the number of regular enlistees the service could take.
2. It was filling up the reserve, now at about 400,000 strength, with "boots" instead of experienced, rated men whom the Navy would like to have on call.

The law requires the Navy to put a reservist on active duty if he applies for it. He is eligible for release after not more than 24 months, such of which time must be spent in training him. Regular enlistments are for four years. Officials said that because of the number of reservists being placed on active duty the Navy was able to enlist only about 25 per cent of the applicants for the regular service.

Accordingly, the navy has set a nationwide reserve enlistment quota of 2,000 men a month, from which, however, men with previous naval service are expected.

The quota may be ended in a year, spokesmen said, when large numbers of regulars who enlisted soon after the Korean War started begin to leave.

**TV 'Private Eyes' Scored by FBI Man**  
BINGHAMTON, N. Y. (AP) — An FBI agent told a police conference recently that television and radio programs that depict police officers as "stupid cops" are "pretty close to being a crime."

Edward J. Powers, special agent in charge of the FBI division at Albany, N. Y., says the law enforcement profession has failed to achieve an effective public relations program.

"If we had accomplished our objective in this respect, certainly the American public would not tolerate television and radio programs which depict police officers as stupid cops, while the 'private eye' is presented as an intelligent visionary who can readily solve any complicated criminal case."

## Perryopolis Becomes Borough, Qualifies For 1 1/2 Million Dollars

UNIONTOWN, Pa. (AP) — After years of legal wrangling, the nearly 10,000 residents of Perryopolis are eligible to claim a 1 1/2 million dollar inheritance from a native daughter.

Perryopolis' fight to become a borough was won at 4 p. m. Thursday when no objections to its incorporation were filed with the State Superior Court.

Mrs. Mary Phil Frazier, who died in 1948 in Philadelphia, left the sum to her native community with the stipulation that Perryopolis become a political entity before being eligible to collect her bequest.

Incorporation of the community of 1,900 was approved last year by the Fayette County Court over the objections of certain supervisors and residents of Perry Township, of which Perryopolis is a part. The objections were raised on the ground that incorporation would deprive the township of revenue in lost taxes on valuable property.

The county court had fixed 4 p. m. yesterday as the deadline for filing appeals with the Superior Court.

Perryopolis elects borough officials in November and they take office next Jan. 1. Then the Cinderella community will collect the money and embark on an ambitious program of public improvements.

Smith's counsel told the court Smith's wife, Beatrice, and William Sykes, Jefferson County district attorney, conspired to have Smith committed.
