

\$2,116,600 Contract Awarded For Cameron County Road Job

HARRISBURG (AP) — The State Highway Department has awarded a \$2,116,600 contract to A. E. Oblock of Unity, Allegheny County, for relocating seven miles of State Highway 872 at a proposed flood control dam site on the First Fork of Sinnemahoning Creek, Cameron County.

The project will raise the road above the flood level of the proposed dam to be built by the General State Authority for the Forests and Waters Department. Sinnemahoning Creek is a tributary of the West Branch of the Susquehanna River.

New Chemical Test Is Used In Drunken Driving Conviction

PITTSBURGH (AP) — A drunken driving conviction based chiefly on a urinalysis appeared in Pennsylvania's legal records today for what is believed to be the first time.

Judge John Drew of the Allegheny County Court found Samuel Price, 42, of nearby Bradwood, guilty Thursday after a police chemist testified a urinalysis showed Price was under the influence of alcohol when his attorney a trolley last Christmas. Attorneys said they knew of no previous case in Pennsylvania where a urinalysis was permitted to stand as convicting evidence. Sentencing of Price was deferred.

A FRANK EXPLANATION

The cost of medicine has risen sharply in recent years. This rise may be attributed to two factors. The first is the economic condition which has caused all commodities to advance in price. The second is the use of new and more beneficial drugs which are highly complex in nature and consequently more costly to manufacture and process. However, many drugs now sell for less than 10 percent of their introductory cost. Penicillin, for example, was reduced in price 93 percent during its first four years of commercial sale. Although modern medicines are more expensive than the simple compounds used a few decades ago, the benefits of shortened periods of illness and reduced suffering far exceed in value the increase in cost.

County Farmers Asked To Supply Data on Wheat

Wheat growers were urged today to cooperate with the Farm Reporter of the County Production and Marketing Administration office who will be visiting all wheat farms in Clearfield County in the near future. The help of wheat growers is urgently needed to bring farm-program records up to date in preparation for possible acreage allotments and marketing quotas on the 1954 wheat crop.

This appeal follows a recent announcement by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson that the United States Department of Agriculture would immediately start the preliminary work necessary in case production and marketing controls are required for the next wheat crop.

According to Steward Straw, Chairman of the County PMA Committee, certain information from farmers is absolutely necessary in order to do a sound administrative job of setting equitable acreage allotments for individual farms. Farm allotments will be determined by the County PMA Committee with the assistance of the community committees.

Data needed includes the farm wheat acreage for the three years, 1951, 1952, and 1953; the location of the farm and other pertinent information. If the farmer operates a rented farm he should supply such additional information as the name and address of the owner.

Mr. Straw emphasizes that the final decision has not yet been made as to whether acreage allotments or marketing quotas will be used for the 1954 crop of wheat. That decision will be made later when more is known about the supply and prospective demand situations. However, the indicated wheat supply is such that production controls will probably be necessary as directed by law.

Proclamation of a national wheat acreage allotment is mandatory unless dispensed with by the Secretary because of a national emergency or a material increase in exports. The proclamation of quotas is mandatory, except under emergency conditions, when supplies reach a certain point specified in the legislation.

An early start on the necessary advance work is particularly urgent, Mr. Straw explained, because the decision and proclamation must be made not later than July 1 for marketing quotas, and July 15 for acreage allotments without quotas. If quotas are proclaimed, a national referendum among growers must be held by July 25.

In requesting the farmers cooperation in supplying the needed information, Mr. Straw said that the Farm Reporters are being requested to obtain the data from all wheat growers so that it will reach the county office not later than May 30, 1953.

Clearfield County has an estimated 1500 farms growing wheat. Acreage allotments were last used for the 1951 crop of wheat but were discontinued before the end of the marketing year. Wheat marketing quotas have been used only twice, for the 1941 and 1942 crops.

PRR Names Stuart Coal Traffic Manager

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The Pennsylvania Railroad has appointed W. Parker Stuart to the new position of coal traffic manager with headquarters here. Stuart, former general coal and ore agent at Cleveland, will be succeeded there by Walter L. Lloyd of Altoona, Pa., PRR's fuel engineer here. The changes were announced yesterday.

Lloyd is a graduate of Pennsylvania State College. He was named fuel engineer in 1950. Stuart, a native of Pittsburgh, had held the Cleveland post since 1945.

Defense Plants In Labor Surplus Areas To Get Special Aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — Companies which build defense plants in areas hard hit by unemployment might get back more quickly much of the cost of the plant, under a new Eisenhower administration program. The program, it was learned this week, was proposed by Secretary of Labor Durrin and approved by the Office of Defense Mobilization.

Aimed at wiping out chronic unemployment, it would work this way: the company would write off in five years, in the form of depreciation for federal tax purposes, up to 100 per cent of a new plant.

The department of labor will certify the "labor surplus areas," such as the 35 regions so named in New England textile and Illinois, Pennsylvania and West Virginia coal mining centers.

The list now includes: Altoona, Pottsville, Scranton, the Clearfield-Du Bois, Sunbury-Shamokin-Mount Carmel, Uniontown - Connellsville and Wilkes-Barre - Hazleton areas of Pennsylvania.
