New Drive For School Safety Opens

With the opening of school only two days away Chief of Police Ole Anderson has issued an appeal to motorists to use extra caution. Slogan for the current safety campaign is "School's Open — Drive Carefully". The local police department and the American Legion Post are cooperating with the Minnesota State Automobile Association (AAA) in the campaign. Special posters are being placed at strategic locations in the city to remind motorists of the need for extra caution in their driving.

"While police and School Safety Patrol members here will provide excellent protection at hazardous corners near schools," Chief Anderson said, "all corners cannot be guarded, and motorists must assume responsibility. With the reopening of schools, I ask all drivers to use utmost caution, particularly in areas where children are going to and from classrooms." Phil Hope of St. Paul AAA representative for this area, urged parents to help their children select the safest school route.

"Many children," he said, "will be attending for the first time, and do not realize the traffic hazards they face. Parents of youngsters starting school, or of children going to school at a new location, should accompany them on the first day to select the safest route. Such a route takes account of where police officers and Safety Patrol members are stationed, where there are traffic signals and stop signs to permit safe crossing, and where there are the fewest number of unprotected corners. Teachers and Safety Patrol members will gladly help parents determine this route."

Dr. Kram Is Co-Author Of Medical Magazine Article

For the first time Albert Lea is co-author of an article appearing in the Minnesota Medicine, official publication of the state medical society. The author is Dr. Charles Kram, until a few weeks ago head of the Community Mental Health Center here. He has since been transferred to St. Paul. Dr. N. J. Berkwitz, Minneapolis psychiatrist, was co-author. The article was based on a statistical survey of patients of the clinic here. Interesting highlights of the article are that 70 per cent of patients no longer require care and that 67 per cent had received maximum benefits from their care. Only 375 per cent of patients require hospitalization after treatment as out patients, the survey showed. The clinic has a twofold purpose. Follow-up treatment is provided for patients provisionally discharged from state hospitals who live near the clinic. In addition psychiatric care is offered to indigent state residents upon referral by their family physicians. The clinic also acts as an educational center for the community regarding mental health matters. The staff consists of a psychiatrist, a psychiatric social worker, a clinical psychologist, and a clerk-stenographer. The clinic is located in one of the office buildings in the Hyde building.
