Anthony Ross, Actor, Dead at 46; Portrayed Professor in Bus Stop

Broadway Performer Since '32 Had Role in 'Country Girl' Film and Many TV Dramas

Anthony Ross, stage actor, died Tuesday night in his sleep at his home, 506 East Eightyninth Street, apparently of a coronary thrombosis, a few hours after playing his featured role, in "Bus Stop" at the Music Box Theatre. His age was 46.

Long recognized as a competent craftsman, Mr. Ross was often considered an impressive actor by critics who had followed his adventures through more than thirty plays as well as a number of Hollywood films and television dramas.

When the comedy "Bus Stop" opened last March, Brooks Atkinson wrote in The New York Times: "In the part of the tipsy professor, Anthony Ross gives his richest performancesardonically witty, pathetically selfcritical, always fluent in the stream of expression." A few days observed further. "There is a mad brilliance about his conversation. He is learned, cultivated, and damned. In Anthony Ross' skillful acting he [the boozy professor] is funny and pathetic, at the same time--the grand manner tempered with selfdeprecating irony."

Other successes enjoyed by Mr. Ross were "Arsenic and Old Lace," 1941; "Winged Victory," 1943; "The Glass Menagerie," 1945, and "Season in the Sun," 1950. Mr. Ross played the part of the heartless producer in "The Country Girl," probably his outstanding film role.

He made his debut on Broadway in 1932, appearing in "Whistling in the Dark." Thereafter he persevered- through seven years of variable fortune, mostly bad. But in 1940, Mr. Ross appeared with Maurice Evans in "King Richard 11" and "Twelfth Night." During World War II he left the theatre for military

intelligence work, save for a hitch on tour with "This Is the Army."

Ten years ago luck really ran his way. He walked right out of the Army into a featured role--that of The Gentleman Caller in "The Glass Menagerie." In 1946, he married the former assistant stage manager of that production, Mary Jean Copeland.

Mr. Ross was born in New York. He graduated from Brown University and studied at the Sorbonne in Paris and the University of Nancy, France. An accomplished linguist, he played the piano and, in his earlier days, was devoted to long canoe trips and cross-country hitch-hiking expeditions.

Members of the cast of "Bus Stop" and others associated with him reported that Mr. Ross had seemed to be in good health Tuesday night.

Surviving are his widow and a son, Stephen. Mr. Ross, who changed his name legally, was son of Charles M. Rosenthal and the late Mrs. Cora S. Rosenthal.
