

Around The Radio Dial Notes On Programs Coming Up Tonight

GABRIEL HEATTER presented a note from a St. Paul (Minn.) listener during one of his recent "Mailbag" programs over Mutual (weekdays, 10:45 to 11) with a simple "no comment" notation.

Here's the note: "I can't find a tenant for my house because a rumor has been started about its being haunted. Some years ago a man did take his own life in the house. And now they say his ghost haunts the place. What can I do?"

Program listeners bombarded Mr. Heatter with their comments—they all wanted a chance to live in the place.

MYSTERY SOLVERS

WPAY has a series of programs outlined for tonight's radio time that should prove to cause many to get out their slouch hats and pipes. The battle of the radio script dramatist and the guessing audience goes on in full style.

"Mr. Keen, Tracer of Lost Persons", one of the regular features on the local radio station's Thursday night lineup, will tell the story of "The Society Murder Case" at 8:30.

Mr. Keen, played by Bennett Kilback, finds a society woman mysteriously dead at the door of his office late one afternoon.

Larry Thor will star as Detective Danny Clover in "Broadway Is My Beat" at 8. Also listed with the schedule of hairraisers is "Counter-Spy" with "The Case of the Spieler" at 7.

Getting into a lighter mystery drama, "Evening Primrose", the yarn of a poet who decides to live in a department store, hiding during the day, and finds a whole community living the same way, is dramatized at 9 on "Escape".

The poet falls in love with Ella, a girl held prisoner since she was lost in the store by her mother when she was six. They plot to escape the community, are caught and turned over to the dark men, nocturnal policemen who live in the undertaking parlors.

A free-lance espionage agent, who willingly offers to work for any nation paying him enough money, attempts to sabotage the Western European rearmament program by planting spurious papers on a leading Danish diplomat. But he forgot to figure in David Harding in "The Case of the Danish Courier" on ABC at 7:30.
