Paul Jackson, county service officer, today reminded World War II veterans with service incurred disabilities of an important deadline in connection with their entitlement to National Service Life Insurance.

Prior to Jan 1, 1950, disabilities incurred in service between Oct 8, 1940, and Sept. 2, 1945, if less than total in degree, are disregarded in determining eli-gibility under the health requirements for NSLI purposes. Jackson said this means that

Jackson said this means that veterans who might not other-wise qualify for life insurance for health reasons may reinstate lapsed NSLI or buy new or ad-ditional insurance up to the \$10,000 maximum if they apply before the end of the year.


A physical examination is re-quired, however, for all insur-ance applied for under this spe-cial provision. Such examina-tions are made by VA without cost to the veteran, Jackson pointed out.
