

# Media Woman's Club Hears State Parliamentarian

Mrs. Alfred I. Crooks, state parliamentarian and past president of both the Delaware County and the Pennsylvania State Federation, spoke to the Woman's Club of Media about "Our Federation," at a meeting held on Wednesday afternoon, Nov. 2, at the clubhouse, S. Jackson st., Media.

Mrs. Crooks stated that the General Federation of Women's Clubs was founded in 1890 in New York City, and the Pennsylvania Federation formed in 1895 at the New Century Club in Philadelphia.

"Every state in the union has its federation of women's clubs, there being about 850 clubs in the United States, but few states have outdistanced Pennsylvania in their individual work groups," she said.

Mrs. Crooks served as president of the Pennsylvania State Federation from 1941 to 1944, the difficult war years, but throughout her term of service, the Pennsylvania Federation won the honor for the greatest number of projects well done, and tied with California for first place for the best reporting in war work.

Stating that clubs came into being through sociability, study and service, Mrs. Crooks advised clubs to have good publicity through rendering efficient service in the community. Mrs. Crooks closed with the quotation from Grace Morrison Poole Reynolds that "A Woman's Club is a group of women in a community who may be depended upon to further all things looking to the betterment of life."

Mrs. Walter G. Emmott, federation secretary, and member of the county board of directors and county chairman of drama, presented the speaker following a luncheon prepared by Mrs. Edward H. Rigby and Mrs. W. Nelson Worthington.
