The Cavalcade of America is an anthology drama series that was sponsored by the DuPont Company. It was initially broadcast on radio from 1935 to 1953, and later on television from 1952 to 1957. Originally on CBS, then later changing to NBC, the series pioneered the use of anthology drama for company audio advertising. The Cavalcade of America documented historical events using stories of individual courage, initiative and achievement, often with feel-good dramatizations of the human spirit's triumph against all odds. This was consistent with Du Pont's overall conservative philosophy and legacy as an American company dating back to 1802. The company's motto, "Maker of better things for better living through chemistry," was read at the beginning of each program, and the dramas emphasized humanitarian progress, particularly improvements in the lives of women, often through technological innovation.

Martin Grams, Jr. is the author of the highly-acclaimed publication, *The History of the Cavalcade of America*, the authorized guide to the history of the popular radio/television series. The 500 page book is available from all major bookstores, including Amazon.com and Borders.com. This book comes highly recommended. It served as an invaluable resource with determining correct titles of episodes. It features an extensive episode guide. Each episode has the names of the radio actors, which allowed, in the case of repeated shows, one production to be distinguished from another.

## Radio Broadcast Log of The Cavalcade Of America

This anthology program had a dual purpose in its existence. To help build a better public imagine of the sponsoring company, Du Pont, which made large profits manufacturing gun powder during World War I, and to dramatize the history of the United States. Very detailed research went into each script and the over all production technique were first rate.

This program also made its appearance on television on the following networks and broadcast dates. A total of 197 30 minutes programs aired.

### Sponsor background information:

Eleuthère Irénée du Pont de Nemours works as an apprentice in chemist Antoine Lavoisier's laboratory at Essone, France at the age of 16. du Pont quickly gathers expertise in the manufacturing of gunpowder.

On 07/19/1802, after moving from France, E.I. du Pont purchases property on the Brandywine River in Delaware and begins construction on his own powder manufacturing plant, Eleutherian Mills. His company, with 18 shares of stock valued at \$2,000 each, is capitalized at \$36,000. On 05/01/1804 he begins the manufacture and sale of gunpowder. Not until 1904 does the company branch out into nongunpowder related areas.

Between 1915 and 1918 DuPont supplies 1.5 billion pounds of military explosives to the Allied Forces and an additional 840 million pounds of dynamite and blasting powder to domestic American industries.

DuPont begins entry into the dye industry and rayon processes between 1917 and 1920. The 1930's is witness to the development of synthetic rubber and early nylon. 1937 was the introduction of safety glass for the automobile industry.

During World War II, the company produces 4.5 billion pounds of military explosives along with nylon for parachutes, tents and ropes. 1952 DuPont develops Mylar polyester film, which has many uses including recording tape (which we all have used in our OTR collections).

In the 1960's they helped produce space suits for our astronauts. The 1970's seen the development of

bullet resistant Kevlar for the military and police agencies.

**The current files** that comprise this Cavalcade of America series consists of 745 episodes. The episode entitled CALV 351006 000 No Turning Back is 60 minutes in length and sponsored by Bell Telephone. It may have been an audition recording. No other information is known about it. The remaining 744 episodes contain **405 new encodes** (exclusively for this version); 29 episodes are from cassettes and 376 from reel to reel. All encodes were done by David Oxford. Many volunteers assisted with the noise reduction, etc., that were used on the files. The new encodes were compared to their existing counterparts and used only if they were judged sonically superior. Many new encodes could not improve upon the exisiting MP3 and were discarded. Nearly all of the remaining 339 episodes are MP3s supplied from The Old Time Radio Purchasing Group. Because of the large size of the series, a 64 kps/44 kHz encoding rate was chosen for the WAV files. All MP3s at 128/44 were converted to 64/44. There was no audible difference to the Volunteer (David Oxford) who did this conversion.

All files were time corrected using the NBC chimes if they were present. If not present, the ear of the listener and "best guess" was used.

There were many repeated episodes of Cavalcade, usually with a very similar cast. In many cases, the proper title

could only be determined by listening to the credits and consulting Martin Grams book. There were many mistitled episodes.

There are several very poor sounding episodes in this set, irregardless of the encoding. There are still many 48 kps and 32 kps episodes in this series that do not have a better sounding replacement. At least the 24 kps and even 16 kps encodes have been replaced! If you have a better sounding recording than what you find here, please contact Ed Sehlhorst (ed\_sehlhorst@yahoo.com) or David Oxford (david0@centurytel.net). We will be happy to replace our recording with yours.

The Cavalcade of America Radio Program sponsored by Du Pont has 781 episodes, plus the audition episode by Bell Telephone. The OTRR Certified Files consists of 745 files - 744 episodes of the series plus the Audition episode. There are a total of 37 missing episodes: 14 episodes "missing" (supposedly available in collector's hands), 17 episodes are considered lost, 5 episodes are uncirculated and 1 episode was never broadcast. It is believed that several of the Uncirculated episodes may soon become available. Some of the missing episodes may be found. The "Lost" will likely remain lost and the Never Broadcast will forever remain unbroadcast.
