Theatre Royal

This fine British anthology series, features plays based on the best of literature, films and English theater. Produced in two series, Sir Lawrence Olivier and Sir Ralph Richardson serve as hosts, narrators and many times portray the leading roles.

The program apparently was developed as a vehicle to capitalize on Olivier's name and talent. His career spanned over 50 years and continues into the 21st century, as in 2004, 15 years after his death, he was starring as Dr. Totenkopf in a Hollywood fantasy film titled, Sky Captain and The World of Tomorrow. This was accomplished by the producers who selected footage of Lord Olivier from various films and used to create a villainous leader of killer robots in the film. Jude Law, who stars in the film, said film-makers used Olivier because few other actors possessed his authority. http://www.skycaptain.com/

Sir Ralph Richardson from 1954 – 1955 played the character of Dr. John Watson in another Harry Alan Towers radio series of Sherlock Holmes stories, which starred Sir John Gielgud as the famous consulting detective.

Many fine actors of the British stage and screen were involved in individual episodes of the Theater Royale series, such as Sir John Gielgud, Robert Morley, Harry Andrews, Muriel Forbes, Robert Donat, and Daphne Maddox.

The music was credited to the renown British organist and arranger, Sidney Torch. However much of the same music was also used in other Harry Alan Towers productions on which Torch also worked, such as the Secrets Of Scotland Yard, Black Museum, and The Many Lives of Harry Lime. So how much of it was actually written for this series will probably never be known.

Harry Alan Towers produced and directed the show for his Towers of London company for international syndication, at the time in Europe, South Africa and Australia. The episodes included in this distribution are from the initial US run on NBC. However selected episodes were repeated, with a different series opening and close on the ABC Mystery Time series during the late 1950s. The show Theater Royale remained in active syndication in the United States well up into the 1970s. Many of the copies in circulation today, come from those 1970s repeats where the individual episodes were cut to about 20 minutes. Luckily these cuts were made by the production company and generally do not take away from the actual program enjoyment. This reduced length comes from a combination for factors including removing dated introductory material from the beginning of the early episodes, making time for local stations to include hourly 5 minute newscasts and to insert commercials locally.

In conclusion, this series consisted of new radio adaptations of famous, and not so famous stories by some of the best authors in the United States and England. It is the inclusion of some of those little known masterpieces by many familiar authors that gives the series a variety element usually missing in this type of

anthology series. Its long syndication run, well into the 70s, proves once again classic stories presented by talented actors never really goes out of style.

1- Queen of Spades – (29:37)

Based on the short story by Alexander Pushkin .

BROADCAST DATE: 4 OCT 1953

STARRING: Orson Welles (Herman Sovotin);

CREDITS: Sir. Lawrence Olivier (host); Harry Alan Towers (producer, Towers of London), Sidney Torch (music director)
PLOT: A supernatural tale based on a short story by Russian poet Alexander Pushkin, this is the portrayal of a poor Captain in the Russian army in the nineteenth Century. His comrades in arms play cards nightly, but he cannot afford to join them until one night he dreams that he has gained from a mysterious aging countess her secret for winning at faro--a secret which legend has it she has sold her soul to obtain.

FIRST LINE: (Fanfare) The National Broadcasting Company presents Sir. Lawrence Olivier your host in "Theater Royale" (Theme) This is Lawrence Olivier. I'm speaking to you from the stage of the Theater Royale, Haymarket, in the heart of London's theater land. This is one of London's oldest theaters and it is appropriate that I should introduce the first of this new series of programs from here. I am at this time rehearsing a new play with my wife Vivian Leigh, and after a short tour, I shall be opening in London early next month. Because of this, although I shall be introducing the program each week, I am for the first few of this series, inviting some of my own good friends of the theater to join me and to appear in subjects of their own choice. My first guest is a very old friend of mine. A good few years ago I have the pleasure of appearing as his guest on his own program from New York, and that is why it gives me particular pleasure to return the compliment, and to reintroduce you, this week, to Orson Welles. Orson has chosen a famous story by Alexander Pushkin which you may know, it is a tale of excitement and suspense which I think you will like. Here he is then, Orson Welles in the role of Herman in "The Queen of Spades"

2- The Overcoat – (29:15)

Based on a short story by Russian author Nikolai Gogol, published in 1842.

BROADCAST DATE: 11 OCT 1953.

STARRING: Michael Redgrave (Akakii Akakievich)

CREDITS: Sir. Lawrence Olivier (host); Harry Alan Towers (producer, Towers of London), Sidney Torch (music director). PLOT: The story centers on the life and death of Akakii Akakievich, an impoverished government clerk and copyist in the Russian capital of St. Petersburg. Akakii is dedicated to his job, taking special relish in the hand-copying of documents, though little recognized in his department for his hard work. Instead, the younger clerks tease him and attempt to distract him whenever they can. His threadbare overcoat is often the butt of their jokes. Akakii decides it is necessary to have the coat repaired, so he takes it to his tailor, Petrovich, who declares the coat irreparable, telling Akakii he must buy a new overcoat.

FIRST LINE: "Transcribed" (Fanfare) The National Broadcasting Company presents Sir. Lawrence Olivier your host in "Theater Royale" (Theme) This is Lawrence Olivier. Once again I have pleasure in welcoming you to our program, and to tell you something about this week's play. As I mentioned last week, I am at this time rehearsing and producing a new stage play in which I am appearing with my wife, and until we open in the west end of London next month, I am introducing as my guests on this series some of my own good friends of the theater. This week, my invitation has, I'm glad to say been accepted by one of our finest axctors, Michael Redgrave. Michael has been appearing this year, at Strattford On Avon with the Shakespheare Memorial Company, and some of you are listening that have visited England during this coronation year. Will I am sure join me in my admiration for his wonderful work. In today's program I have ask him to chose for himself a subject in which he would like to appear. He has selected a tale by Nikolai Gogol, that is called, The Overcoat. Here then is Michael Redgrave in the role of Akakii Akakievich, yes that's right Akakii Akakievich. (Music).

BROADCAST DATE: 18 OCT 1953

STARRING: Ralph Richardson, Campbell Singer, Eric Berry, possibily Nicholas Smith (as Number 1)

CREDITS: Sir. Lawrence Olivier (host); Harry Alan Towers (producer, Towers of London), Sidney Torch (music director)

DB Brighton (adapter).

PLOT: World War One naval story about a Commanding Officer and a Northman.

FIRST LINE: Now transcribed, Theater Royale (Fanfare) The National Broadcasting Company presents Sir. Lawrence Olivier your host in "Theater Royale." (Theme) This is Lawrence Olivier. In a few weeks time when a new stage play in which I am appearing with my wife comes to London's West End, I shall have the pleasure of appearing each week in a different play on this program. But until then I am very happy to have the opportunity of introducing as my guests so of my own friends from the theater. Today's guest is an exceptionally good companion of mine, and we have had many happy associations together on the stage. You may perhaps recall our visit to the United States some years ago with the Old Vick Theater Company. I'm speaking, of course, of Ralph Richardson. CREDITS: Sir. Lawrence Olivier (host); Harry Alan Towers (producer, Towers of London), Sidney Torch (music director).

PLOT: The story of a man who deceives a woman with a mask in order to marry her.

FIRST LINE: By transcription. (Fanfare) The National Broadcasting Company presents Sir. Lawrence Olivier your host in "Theater Royale" (Theme) This is Lawrence Olivier. Once again it is my pleasure to introduce a good friend of mine from the theater and the story he has chose for your entertainment. As many of you will already know, I am at this time preparing for its London presentation a new play. But in a few weeks time, I shall myself have the pleasure of appearing for you each week in various roles. Meantime, this week, I'm glad to tell you my invitation has been accepted by an actor whose name will be very familiar to you all, and who I am happy to count among my friends, John Gielgud. His work in the theater, both in London and New York will, of course, be familiar to you and many of you will have seen him in the recent Hollywood film production of Julius Caesar. PLOT: Alain Sire de Maletroit has set a clever trap to capture the man who is sending love letters to his beautiful niece Blanche. Near her room, he has constructed a trick door that locks shut once someone has walked through it.

FIRST LINE: (Fanfare) The National Broadcasting Company presents transcribed Sir. Lawrence Olivier your host in "Theater Royale" (Theme) This is Lawrence Olivier. I shall quite shortly, as you know, be appearing each week in various roles in this series. But until then it is my pleasure to present to you some of my own good friends from the theater. My guest this week is an actor that will familiar to you through films such as, Goodbye Mr. Chips, the Citadel, The Count of Monte Cristo, the Ghost Goes West, The Winslow Boy, The Magic Box, and many more. FIRST LINE: (Fanfare) The National Broadcasting Company presents transcribed Sir. Lawrence Olivier your host in "Theater Royale" (Theme) This is Lawrence Olivier. Once again it is my pleasure to introduce to you a guest from the theater, who is going to appear in this weeks program. Next week, incidentally, I look forward to taking over the leading roles myself in this theater. Today's guest will, I feel sure, be already familiar to you through the many films he has made which has enjoyed success in the United States. During the past few weeks I've had the pleasure of introducing in this series, a number of good friends of the theater. It was, of course written many years ago, and my friends in America will, I am sure, accept the jest in the spirit in which it is written. FIRST LINE: (Fanfare) The National Broadcasting Company presents transcribed Sir. Lawrence Olivier in "Theater Royale" (Theme) This is Lawrence Olivier. Today's play is based on a short story by Guy de Maupassant. I myself shall be playing the part of Joseph Renardet who tells the tale. The story takes place in France. As we have no wish to disconcert the citizens of the capitol city of Arkansas we have altered the title which it has here to before gone by Little Roque. FIRST LINE: (Fanfare) The National Broadcasting Company presents transcribed Sir. Lawrence Olivier in "Theater Royale" (Theme) This is Lawrence Olivier. Today's play is adapted from some sequences chosen from Charles Dickens immortal Pickwick Papers. We've have taken our title from perhaps the most famous trial in the history of fiction. And I myself shall be playing the role of that most formable Sergeant At Law, Sergeant Buss Fuzz. So now back we go through many loving years to hear the case of Bardell vs Pickwick (Music)

Based on the story by Herman Melville BROADCAST DATE: 13 FEB 1954

STARRING: Sir. Lawrence Olivier (host, and star),

CREDITS: Harry Alan Towers (producer, Towers of London), Sidney Torch (music director).

PLOT: The narrator, torn between pity and exasperation, also discovers that Bartleby apparently has no home or friends, and lives in the office. But the employer does not want to fire him.

FIRST LINE: (Fanfare) The National Broadcasting Company presents transcribed Sir. Lawrence Olivier in "Theater Royale" (Theme) This is Lawrence Olivier. Once again it is my pleasure to introduce to you another in this series of programs. And this week my choice of subject is for the first time the work of an American author, and a mighty American author too. Herman Melville. It's a favorite story, but unexpected both in mood and setting. Almost impossible to associate with the author of Moby Dick, written in a comedy vein but a strange tenderness adhears to it. A haunting melocholy just under the surface of its light hearted extererior. Hope it will interest you as it does me. I'm to play the part of Master in Chancelory whop tells the story. The setting is New York many years ago and the title is Bartleby. (Music)
